Men -

- **Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.** (born Michael King Jr.; January 15, 1929 April 4, 1968) was an **American Christian minister and activist** who became the most visible spokesperson and leader in the civil rights movement from 1955 until his assassination in 1968.
- George Washington Carver (1860s

 January 5, 1943) was an American
 agricultural scientist and inventor who promoted alternative crops to cotton
 and methods to prevent soil depletion. He was the most prominent black scientist
 of the early 20th century.

Pastor Fred Price and the Crenshaw Christian Center have erected a 10,000-seat sanctuary in Los Angeles, California – The Faith Dome which at the time (1981) was the largest domed church in the United States

Women -

- Harriet Tubman (born March 1822 March 10, 1913) was an
 American abolitionist and political activist. Born into slavery, Tubman
 escaped and subsequently made some 13 missions to rescue approximately 70
 enslaved people, including family and friends, using the network of antislavery
 activists and safe houses known as the Underground Railroad. During
 the American Civil War, she served as an armed scout and spy for the Union
 Army. In her later years, Tubman was an activist in the movement for women's
 suffrage.

- Mary Jane McLeod Bethune (born Mary Jane McLeod; July 10, 1875 May 18, 1955[1]) was an American educator, stateswoman, philanthropist, humanitarian, and civil rights activist. Bethune founded the National Council for Negro Women in 1935, established the organization's flagship journal Aframerican Women's Journal, and resided as president or leader for myriad African American women's organizations including the National Association for Colored Women and the National Youth Administration's Negro Division.

- Azuza Street revival The Azusa Street Revival was a historic Pentecostal
 revival meeting that took place in Los Angeles, California and is the origin of the
 Pentecostal movement. It was led by William J. Seymour, an African
 American preacher. It began with a meeting on April 14,1906 and continued
 until roughly 1915. The revival was characterized by ecstatic spiritual
 experiences accompanied by miracles, dramatic worship services, speaking in
 tongues, and inter-racial mingling.
- The National Baptist Convention, under the leadership of Dr. T.J. Jemison, has constructed a mega-modern \$12 million headquarters in Nashville, Tennessee.
